Nicola Priestly, Bunny Willing, and Barbara Tucker were hosted by Darlene Periconi (TUHSD), Becky Veenstra (Tempe Prep), and Lisa Prillaman (TD3). Our Kiwi friends had a full slate of school visits and tours of Arizona.

The interviews for our 2011 Educator Exchange were held last November when six deserving people were chosen to spend three weeks in Germany, New Zealand, or China. 
Youth Group Update
