History Corner: The First Educator Exchange

Some of TSC projects have grown over many years. Details of the origin of a few are obscure. Finding these records, physical and oral, is one of our jobs. Descriptions will be written for events that have little or no documentation. We are starting with the professional education program.

We believe that the first TSC educator to teach abroad for us is Ann Nevitt. Shirlee King had accepted an assignment to work out an educator exchange. In 1982, The Nevitts hosted the Lower Hutt delegate Sarah Plumb. Ann volunteered to return with Sarah to teach for two weeks for elementary Principal David Plumb (Sarah's father). She taught at a different school each day. She says the Maori children thought our kids rode horses to school. Brand new library books were exchanged. These titles were placed in Tempe schools. Ann gave followup presentations of her experience to Tempe elementary teachers and students. David Plumb visited here soon after. The Nevitts donated the cost of this whole project.

The Nevitts and Plumbs have continued their friendship to this day. Daughter Cindy and Sarah have visited each other's families.
