## Harry Mitchell, Don Carlos Award Recipient 2012

Tempe Community Council has named former U.S. Congressman and former Tempe Mayor Harry Mitchell its 2012 Don Carlos Humanitarian of the Year.

Mitchell will be honored at the annual Don Carlos Awards Ceremony on at 5:30 p.m. Oct. 10 at the Arizona Historical Society Museum at Papago Park, 1300 N. College Ave.

"Obviously, I'm very honored because this award means so much to Tempe," Mitchell said. "I think it symbolizes Tempe is a community that relies on volunteers."

A half-dozen people submitted letters of support of Mitchell's nomination, citing his years of service to the community, his advocacy for veterans, and his friendly, approachable leadership style.

"That statue (of Mitchell) next to City Hall just isn't tall enough for me," said Ron Pies. "As a person, Harry Mitchell has never changed. He has always been respectful, friendly and 100 percent supportive of anything that benefited his constituents."

Jane and Dick Neuheisel, Don Carlos award recipients in 2005, said Mitchell stands at the forefront of what the Don Carlos recognition means to the community.

"His character is above reproach," they wrote in a joint letter. "His leadership is second to none. His service to others is without comparison and his many achievements are without equal."

This year's awards ceremony is particularly significant because 2012 marks the 40th year of Tempe Community Council's partnering with Tempe to coordinate services and allocate funding for the city's human-service needs. Also, the new mayor of Tempe, Mark Mitchell, is Harry Mitchell's son. It is traditional for the mayor to speak at the awards ceremony, extolling the virtues of the award recipient. The younger Mitchell is proud that his father was chosen.

"My dad exemplifies the spirit of the Don Carlos Humanitarian Award," Mark Mitchell said. "Don Carlos was the nickname of Tempe's founder, Charles Trumbull Hayden. "In many ways, my dad is the founder of modern-day Tempe. He was instrumental in the redevelopment of downtown Tempe, laying the groundwork for the Rio Salado and implementing many of the quality-of-life programs we cherish in Tempe. His vision helped create this great Tempe we enjoy today."

Harry Mitchell played an instrumental role in establishing the Tempe Community Council and served as a board member during the years he served on the Tempe City Council, 1970-78. He then became mayor until 1994. He was a state senator and served in the U.S. House of Representatives.

A Tempe High and Arizona State graduate, he also taught American Government and Economics at Tempe High from 1964 to 1992. He has served on dozens of boards of directors, advisory boards and committees, and he also played a significant role in establishing the Tempe Sister Cities program. He has won dozens of awards for his volunteerism and public service.
