Chelsea Schell's Germany Educator Exchange Experience

I have always jumped on any opportunity to observe my colleagues. To be given a chance to watch and learn from master teachers across seas would be crazy to pass by in my opinion. The Tempe Sister Cities program was something I have been interested in since the beginning of my career, and it was thrilling to get an experience that went beyond my expectations.

After a fourteen hour flight with my eyes unable to stay shut for even a minute, we arrived in Regensburg, Germany. Our hosts stood at the arrival gate with an American flag spread hanging between them and huge smiles. What a welcome! Alfred, my host's father, picked me up since Lukas's schedule at school was packed. It felt like a piece of the puzzle had finally been connected as I got to know the man Lukas had told me so much about during our time together in Arizona. As we drove through the Napa of hops, I quickly realized they had the same phrases and were even opinioned about the same things.

Less than twenty four hours later, I was getting ready for my first visit at my first school. It was rainy and muggy. The weather was suffocating and made me wish I had brought cooler clothes. Upon arrival, Lukas was informed that the principal would be introducing me to the staff. Being a teacher with most of my day spent in front of a crowd, I wasn't nervous. It became my first moment feeling like an outsider where the language made me think I was in a Charlie Brown classroom. The principal apologized for her lack of ability to speak fluent English. Understandably, she and Lukas spoke to the entire staff in German with me in front. They smiled, nodded, and laughed, while I just smiled back having no idea what they were discussing for fifteen minutes. Now, I have a better understanding of what my ELL students feel as they enter into an American classroom for the first time.

Christian was the first teacher that let me enter into his world and, wow, what a world it was. He was the art teacher. He wore a black pin stripped suit and walked faster down the hall than I jog in the park. He always had somewhere to be. It was obvious his students respected his expertise. We sat in the back at his antique wood table sipping coffee and munching on scones as the students enthusiastically showed off the art pieces they had been working on. He is an inspiring teacher and person.

The next day, I was in awe again. It was an ELL classroom, except in German and the number of native languages spoken in the classroom was more than the number of fingers I have on my hands. The students were in their teens and they ran the classroom. The routines were clearly in place. The teacher was the facilitator while the students learned the language through experiencing it. Anyone could see that every culture and language of the students was respected by their actions and the displays on the walls. Seeing the students come together from so many different backgrounds and learning from each other in their new surrounding was teaching as its best.

From one day to the next, we saw more and more amazing teachers and instructional strategies. The schools were different too. From the art on the walls and classroom window's wide open to the ways the students behaved in the school. I quickly found out why our German exchange teachers were so shocked at our students walking in straight quiet lines down the hall. I was truly just as shocked when I saw the students skipping and jumping and giggling to and from one area of the school to the next. "As long as they are focused during class, and we can't forget that they are kids," the principal said.

The kids were definitely releasing their energy in the school, but they also had high expectations of themselves. They wanted to learn. It was even obvious after school. Ursula, one of our German hosts, had two daughters. I could not believe the amount of time they spent after school studying. I wondered if this was only because they were the daughters of a teacher. Lukas explained to me that it was all up to the student. The teacher needs to teach each child to his or her best ability, but in the end it is up to the student to learn the material and pass. It got me thinking about who had more pressure to pass in Arizona: the students or the teacher.

With the great number of master teachers I was able to observe, I did a lot of reflecting on the school system in Arizona. There are some things we have down pat, but there is always room for improvement. After a big hug from Lukas and his wife Ines, Alfred drove me back to the airport. It came to a full circle. I left happy. I was happy to have developed good relationships with fellow teachers and others, and ready to use this experience to better myself in areas beyond school.
