The Gift of Exchange

I am so grateful for the educator exchange because it has changed my life: it has changed my teaching, increased my sense of adventure, and opened my heart and mind to other cultures...native cultures...fascinating cultures! Are you wondering where these amazing things might have happened? Lower Hutt, New Zealand is where I found an open gate to a side of me I was longing to spend time with.





My most amazing memories include bungee jumping over an emerald green river, which actually peacefully raged (if you can imagine that) through a beautiful canyon. I also enjoyed finding some hot springs along a lake made for conservation of wildlife. Every waterfall gripped me with a sense of oneness and I saw a rainbow absolutely every single day! I enjoyed getting to know new people, including teachers and administrators that were captivating at their craft and a lot of fun to hang out with.

I was amazed to learn that the schools are independent of one another. Each school has its own board, and they are evaluated much differently than how we are evaluated here. For starters, they have an actual "tea" time twice a day and the teachers go to the lounge and have tea together! I'd only heard of such things, now I've experienced it J I immediately embraced how they value culture, creativity, families, community, play, nature, and things like knitting and gardening. Let's just say they didn't have a block schedule J I did indeed bring a portion of that back and have been implementing more time for the "whole child" upon my return.

My most valuable take-away was the exposure I had to the Maori culture. Upon my arrival, there was a school assembly of sorts. I was greeted by the girls of the school, who did a Pacific Island-style dance, while singing a beautiful Maori song. Then the boys did the Haka, which is a warrior dance complete with the ancestral war cry. There was so much power in the eyes of those children that I got goose bumps just watching them. Every school I went to taught the Maori language, art, dance, and song. It was amazing to see

children, either Maori or not, connect with the history of their country, the history of

themselves. The children had a strong sense of connection to the world, to God, to their families, and to themselves. I made a lot of great friends and hope to return soon. I strongly encourage anybody who is considering the exchange to go for it!
