## TSC Exchange Launches a Global Citizen's Year

When Corona del Sol 2016 graduate Jamie Cohen was selected as a Tempe Sister Cities delegate to Regensburg, Germany in the spring of 2015, she knew she was going to embark on an adventure which would have a lasting impact on her life. After spending almost six weeks away, she came back with the realization that her college plans had to include a university with a strong study-abroad program.

As she searched, she noticed that many universities were encouraging students to take a gap or "bridge" year. She found a couple of programs which started their freshman year with a year abroad, some even offering a full year of credit while living in another country. Jamie then came across a program called *Global Citizen Year*.

Jamie immediately felt this was the exact program she was looking for. She applied, and, after a rigorous interview process was accepted as a 2017 Global Citizen Year fellow.

This fall, Global Citizen Year will send 100 high school seniors to one of four countries they partner with: Ecuador, Brazil, Senegal and India.

As an applicant, Jamie wrote essays to describe each country and why she felt each one would be a good fit, ranking her choices. Ecuador was at

the top of her list. "I wanted to become fluent in Spanish and the connection with Cuenca, one of the Tempe Sister Cities, were two of the main reasons I hoped to be paired with Ecuador. Everyone I have met from Cuenca has been so nice that I wanted to have the opportunity to live among the happiest people on earth."

The design of Global Citizen Year is structured to gain both language and cultural immersion, as well as to provide students with an internship in an area they want to study in college. Jamie will leave in mid-August for San Francisco where she will have a two-week orientation and meet the other 2017 fellows. From there, she and her other Ecuadorian cohorts of approximately 40 students will depart for Quito, where they will live and study Spanish together for approximately six weeks. During this time, in-country coordinators will get to know Jamie and the other

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### What is a Global Citizen?

Global Citizen Year was founded by Abigail Falik, who upon her own high school graduation, struggled to find an opportunity – outside military or religious service – for real world work and immersion before college. She posed the question: where is the opportunity for young people to learn about themselves and the wider world before college?

After nearly a decade working as a social entrepreneur in the US and communities around the world, Abby enrolled at Harvard Business School to develop the skills, strategy and networks to bring her long-held vision of a pre-college "bridge year" to life. In 2008, Abby entered the Harvard Business School Pitch for Change competition with a bold vision: she proposed that one day, a global bridge year before college would become the norm, not the exception. Abby won first place in the competition that day – catalyzing Global Citizen Year's transition from a big idea into a reality.

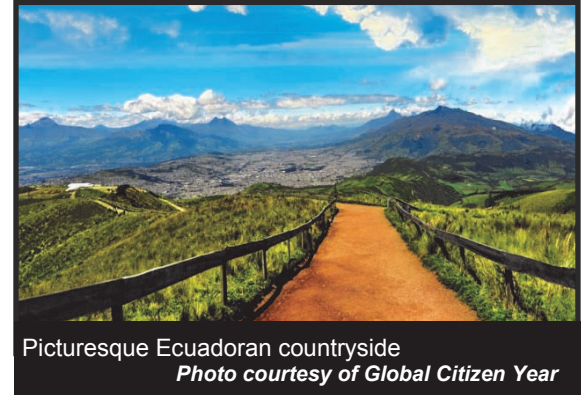

fellows and try to match them in an internship which fits their future career goals. Some fellows teach, others work in non-profit organizations, government or even agricultural communities. Fellows will spend six months in their internship, meeting up with other fellows periodically for training and travel opportunities. While in her internship, she will live with a host family so she can become fully immersed with an Ecuadoran family.

Most people think that gap years are expensive. Global Citizen Year is committed to making a bridge year affordable to all families regardless of their socioeconomic situation. In past years, over 80% of fellows received some form of financial assistance and 30% received a full scholarship. Besides being funded by large foundations who see the benefit of a gap year, Global Citizen Year also asks its fellows to pay it forward to future fellows. The 2016 class raised money for the 2017 scholarship fund and now the 2017 class is doing the same. This also gives fellows preparing to leave for their time away the opportunity to raise awareness of the program and mobilize their community. Jamie received a significant scholarship. "The scholarship I received would not have been possible without the dedicated fundraising efforts of the fellows who have come before me. I am immensely grateful for their hard work and now it is time for me to pay it forward!" she says. "Although I will be spending a year outside of the academic classroom, it is my belief that my education will not be put on hold, but rather accelerated through real world experiences. My hope is that my year abroad allows me to unlock new passions, potential and purpose that will be the launching pad for all my future academic and career endeavors."
